We have three primary programs: sponsorships, scholarships and special projects for children.





Adapting to a global pandemic - meeting the moment

Dear Friends and Supporters,

When I sat down to compose my thoughts about what I wanted to say to you about the past year I kept trying to come up with a succinct phrase to summarize what we've all gone through. But what we experienced over the past 15 months – as a world, as a nation, and as a charity – was simply incomparable.

It was a moment unlike any other in our lifetime and it called for unforeseen response from you to ensure the safety of the children. In spring and summer of 2020, when the world first realized just how serious covid was, the orphanage administrators in India let us know they were going out into the villages where many of the children were temporarily staying with relatives to bring them food, face masks, medicine and other supplies. And these women were doing the same thing for poor people in their neighborhoods who – because of the strict lockdown – had no work, no savings, and no food.

They were meeting the moment by risking their own lives to help others.

We jumped on their mission of mercy and asked if you would help them. And you responded beyond our expectations. Recently we learned that many orphanage staff had contracted covid and were hospitalized. We put out an emergency appeal in late May to help raise funds to pay their medical expenses. Again, you met the moment of urgent need for the women who care for the children. Your response has been amazing.

What was it like for the children? Well, it isn't over by any means. For the second time the Indian government forced many of the orphanage kids to return to their relatives as another covid surge engulfed India. I think you all are aware from news reports just how bad the situation is in India.

How could the children continue their education if they could not attend school? Like most governments around the world, the Indian government decided every child should use computers, tablets and smart phones to attend remote classes. And while children from middle class families might have those tools, kids from the orphanages certainly did not. It was another critical moment for our children and again you stepped up, this time to pay for the electronic devices they needed for their studies.

After the first lockdown in India ended and the children returned to the orphanages, we got letters from some of the kids written to their sponsors. Reading those letters was really eye-opening for us. Here is a passage I copied from one girl's letter to her sponsor that captures the emotions the children are going through.

"During the time of lockdown some days we had no sufficient food to eat. Fortunately, sisters came with provisions, vegetables, dry fruits and snacks. They told me whenever you need anything just phone them.

"I was so happy that they were there for me. After few days I expressed my desire to go back to the children's home. I did covid test and I rejoined with other children. That was my happiest moment. Now I have no fear. Anything happens, sisters are with me to take care of me."

That says a lot about the loving care the staff provides to their children. Soon all the children will return to their orphanages and we expect many more children orphaned by covid will also come.

Thanks to the generosity of donors during our 2020 annual campaign, the children will find a homelike environment where they will feel safe.

Even in the midst of the worst pandemic in a century, you made their lives better. Thank you for caring for the children.



Impact in 2020



797 sponsors and donors contributed to WC programs.



33 projects were funded to improve the children's homes in 2020.



927 children were sponsored in 2020.



278 students received college scholarships for the 2020-21 academic year.



32 homes (housing >3,000 children) received direct support in the form of sponsorship and/or project funding.



120,000 adults and children in 211 villages were educated about child trafficking in India and how to prevent it during the first three years of this project.



25 grants were given for coronavirus hunger relief in villages in India.

12,297 girls and boys in 80 schools in the region of Telangana, India were educated about child trafficking and formed groups to help prevent it during the first three years of this project.

Where we work

World's Children currently works in 32 orphanages and children's homes. 30 homes are in India, one in Ethiopia and one in Guatemala.

Child sponsorship

The World's Children Sponsorship Program is our largest program. We help orphans and vulnerable children who live in an orphanage or children's home due to a wide variety of circumstances.

Your sponsorship fee is used to purchase nutritious food, clothing, medicine, books, supplies, and other necessities.

The children's homes are like large families. Sponsors receive letters, photos, drawings, and progress reports about their child.

Scholarships

Our college scholarship and vocational training program for disadvantaged young men and women in India changes lives and lifts families out of poverty.

In 2020, World's Children provided scholarships for 278 students. This includes children who grow up in our sponsorship program and other needy students we identify through our partners. We also provide scholarships at two nursing colleges in India where we support the most vulnerable students.

We put a strong emphasis on education and successful outcomes because this will uplift not only the child you will come to know and love when you sponsor them, but society as a whole.



Prevention of Child Trafficking Program (PCT) - Results

~ It takes a village to prevent child trafficking ~



Over a three-year period, the PCT team of five staff members educated over 120,000 adults and children living in 211 villages, and 12,297 girls and boys in 80 schools.

Because this prevention program is so successful and cost-effective, WC is extending support for three more years. The team will continue their current program and enlarge the area to include villages in two more districts in Telangana, India that are hard-hit by traffickers. The continuing program will serve 393,629 people in three districts that include both urban and rural communities. See the full report:

Keys to success of the PCT Program

Flood the area with information, involve the community and the children, educate through movies. Create a community of watchers.





Prevention of Child Trafficking Accomplishments 2017-2020



113 victims have been rescued from trafficking. In one area, the number of trafficked children plummeted from 115 to almost zero.

120,000 villagers and children in 211 villages have been educated about trafficking.

67,798 villagers have watched trafficking awareness videos.

20,240 children in 88 schools also have watched the videos.

270 women's self-help groups, comprised of 10,110 women, have met to discuss prevention of trafficking. They also identified 13 victims of domestic violence and helped rescue some of the trafficking victims.

128 Community Vigilant Committees have been formed.

80 Child Vigilant Clubs were formed. Each group comprised 10 students, one teacher, one PCT staff, and one member of Childline.

270 school dropouts were identified by Child Clubs and Community Vigilant Committees. Child Clubs also prevented seven child marriages.

Other Groups—The PCT team also has worked with a variety of other parties affected by trafficking. They met with:

- 180 sex workers to motivate them to give up business and help them take up other occupations.
- 290 taxi and bus drivers because these men provide the primary means of transportation for traffickers.
- 96 police officers since rescue can be a real challenge due to threats and lack of shelters for those rescued.
- 150 members of professional groups such as: Child Welfare Committee, media, revenue officers, school teachers, etc.
- 363 members of various community groups such as farming and youth groups.

Coronavirus Relief for Villages in India





WC made 25 grants in 2020 totaling \$17,746 to help our overseas partners provide covid relief in their surrounding villages in India.

The Healthy Child Fund

The Remote Education Project

Coronavirus created the necessity for all children to attend classes remotely throughout India. The administrators asked for computers, laptops, tablets, projectors and phones so the children and college students would not get behind in their studies. Generous donors provided this much needed technology for 16

homes that serve 1,325 children.






